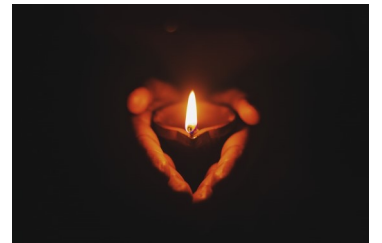
REFRESHMENTS AFTER EUCHARIST

PRAYER

This week the Church of England have offered an email series based on praying. It has been a pleasant reminder of why we pray, taking into account how this may have changed over the past year and thinking about where and how we pray. It can be refreshing to reflect on how and why we do this and to think of how others do this to grow in this practise. The words are from Stephen Cottrell:

"Don't worry if you find it difficult. It doesn't depend on you nearly as much as you think. "I cannot pray", the great Dutch spiritual writer Henri Nouwen once said "but God can pray in me". IT took me a long while to learn this, and even so it is a truth I often forget. I imagine prayer to be somehow dependant on my effort, or worse, my eloquence.

There is a paradox to prayer. It is about the gift of God, and God praying in us, but it also has to be an act of human will. God calls out to every human heart and longs to make a home in every human heart. But God waits for us to respond. When we do, it is God's delight to come to us and sing his song within us. Our voice - however faint and unsure of the tune - is joined to the song of the Spirit."

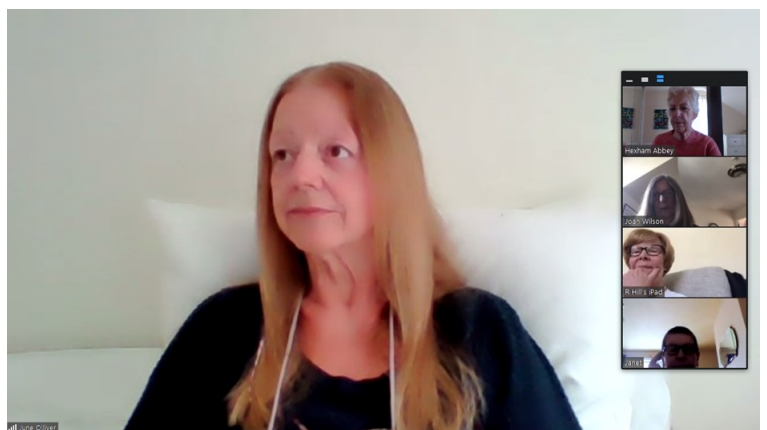


ZOOM COFFEE LOUNGE

21 YEARS AGO...

When you have the opportunity, stand in the middle of the crossing and look up. You can just make out signs of a trap door in the floor of the ringing room. In the year 2000 two new bells were hoisted up through here, and on up to where the bells hang. It was the culmination of a Millennium Project to augment the ring of eight bells to a ring of ten.

The story of the 'ten for 2000' project was published in April 2000 in 'The Ringing World', the weekly journal for bellringers. One of our long-standing ringers has sent me a copy to use for this piece, as this event pre-dates my move to Hexham. Opinions differ on who wrote the article, though perhaps they are simply being modest or very polite. Bellringing is a team activity after all. It is certainly a delight to read, telling a story of enthusiasm, energy and teamwork.

In November 1998 the Abbey backed the plan to install two new trebles and the project became a Millennium Project for the town. Twelve months of 'energetic and ingenious fund-raising' followed, and some of the band travelled to the Whitechapel bell foundry in London to see the bells cast in September 1999. The new bells arrived at the Abbey in November, greeted by a crowd of several hundred, led into the Abbey by a piper, and garlanded in flowers. The bells were eventually hoisted into position in March 2000.

The ringers were keen to refurbish the ringing chamber, improve the sound control, banish years of pigeon droppings, and update fixtures and fittings. Plans were in place to cover the organ to protect it from debris once the trap door was opened. However, the team thought they would make a start on some clearing and painting a week earlier... As the article records, 'our activities were brought to an abrupt halt when the Director of Music received a shower of debris on his head whilst playing the organ!' Fortunately no damage was done this time, unlike in 1885. During the work a newspaper cutting from May 1885 was discovered describing 'how the organ "had been irretrievably ruined owing to cleaning down the great tower ringing chamber, the entire organ being choked with dust"'.

When the new bells were tested for the first time there was much applause and even a few tears. The full 'sparkle of the music of [the] ten bells' was reserved for the official inauguration of the bells on the morning of the 23rd April 2000. It was Easter Sunday morning, arguably the most important day of the year for the bells to be heard, and so it is a great sadness that due to Covid restrictions the bells could not be rung this Easter and for the second Easter running. Hopefully we will be back with you in the coming months.
